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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The NSW Government has committed \$750 million to the redevelopment of Royal Prince Alfred (RPA) Hospital to deliver a new hospital building and refurbishment of existing spaces.

The project is currently in the planning and design phase, and a Design Excellence Competition was recently run for the RPA Redevelopment. The results of this consultation outcomes report will inform design outcomes and inform further opportunities to engage with the visitors and patients and the staff of RPA.

Community, consumer and staff input into the planning, design and delivery of the \$750 million RPA Redevelopment is essential to create a welcoming facility that meets the healthcare needs of the community that RPA Hospital serves, well into the future.

The concept design was informed by clinical requirements, independent technical assessments and importantly, feedback from the community, staff and consumers.

This outcomes report details consultation & engagement activities that were undertaken to ensure everyone who was interested had an opportunity to understand the design, ask questions and provide staff feedback during the engagement of the concept design for the redevelopment in September 2022.

Engagement statistics

During the engagement period for the concept design, the survey was promoted in a number of ways, a summary of these is outlined below.

INTRODUCTION

Consultation and engagement objectives

The Sydney Local Health District (SLHD) and Health Infrastructure (HI) objectives that underpin the approach to communications and engagement for the RPA Redevelopment are:

- Genuine and meaningful engagement across the lifecycle of the project to ensure local voices inform key outcomes
- 2. Build on critical and long-established relationships to engage in the RPA Project
- 3. Garner support for key operational changes required to facilitate the delivery of the project
- 4. Build awareness of RPA Redevelopment
- 5. Demonstrate to staff they are valued partners and that their feedback informs the planning process
- 6. Ensure accurate, timely and regular information is disseminated to staff and other key stakeholders
- 7. Highlight benefits and drivers for the project, including future health, educational, research and employment opportunities.

About the project

The NSW Government committed \$750 million to the redevelopment of Royal Prince Alfred (RPA) Hospital to deliver a new hospital building and refurbishment of existing spaces.

This is the most significant investment in RPA's 140-year history to support the world-leading services provided at RPA for the 740,000 people who live in SLHD and the more than 1 million people who come into the district each day to work, study and visit.

In 2019, the RPA Clinical Services Plan (CSP) was developed by the SLHD in collaboration with the Executive and staff of the RPA Hospital and Ministry of Health (MoH), that forecasts future healthcare needs to 2031.

The redevelopment will include expanded and enhanced:

- Emergency Department.
- Intensive Care Services.
- Medical imaging services.
- Operating theatres.
- Maternity, birthing and neonatal services.
- Adult inpatient accommodation / beds.
- Associated clinical and non-clinical support services capacity.

The design is being informed by clinical requirements, independent technical assessments and feedback from the community, health service staff and consumers.

CONSULTATION APPROACH

The approach to communications and engagement is informed by (ongoing and reviewed) detailed stakeholder analysis, understanding of potential issues and risks, NSW Health internal communications and engagement requirements and the NSW Government's statutory requirements for community participation in the State Significant Development Application (SSDA) process.

It is important to note that communications and engagement activities to support Project delivery will be required outside of the SSDA process.

The SLHD and HI guiding principles that underpin the approach to communications and engagement for the RPA Redevelopment are:

- Proactive and transparent communications
- Proactive stakeholder engagement
- Coordinated information
- Collaboration.

The purpose of the consultation sessions was to deliver presentations to and engage in discussions with stakeholders and community groups to gather feedback, ideas or options both formal and informal.

The broad key objectives of this program were:

- Build relationships with key stakeholders and community to obtain support and awareness
- Undertake early engagement with key stakeholders and community
- Provide an avenue for feedback to be considered by project team in future design stages.

Concept Design Consultation Approach

The RPA Hospital Redevelopment Project team, together with the SLHD invited staff, consumers and community members to attend a series of engagement sessions running throughout September 2022. The program was designed as a vehicle to celebrate the project milestone of publicly unveiling the concept designs and allowed the project team to cultivate feedback on the design. Feedback was encouraged informally via inperson conversations and formally via the survey and written correspondence.

Information was provided via multiple channels to ensure a wide audience was reached, this included:

- Media Release from the Health Ministers Office
- Website update inclusive of:
 - fact sheet on design competition
 - fact sheet on concept design phase
 - newsletter promoting attendance of roadshow sessions
- Pop-ups in the RPA Hospital foyer
- Online community meetings
- Email out to Project Subscribers

- All Staff Information Session
- General Manager Electronic Distribution Mailout out to all staff
- Posters
- Survey
- Letterbox drop
- Shops/Business drop of collateral along Missenden Road

The program allowed for targeted community engagement through multiple channels and opportunities targeting community, consumers and staff living and working in the Camperdown Health District.

Engagement activities

1. Pop-Ups

A series of pop-ups were held in the RPA Hospital Foyer to ensure that the community, consumers, and staff could view and provide feedback on the concept designs that have recently been unveiled for RPA Hospital Redevelopment. Pop-ups were held for a duration of 7 hours over the week commencing 12 September 2022. Pop-ups were held at different times each day to ensure ongoing foot traffic, with ebbs and flows taken into consideration and everyone having an opportunity to drop in and ask questions and view the designs.

The foyer in RPA Hospital is a busy place and foot traffic was steady throughout the week. On average up to 50 individuals dropped by each day. Multiple project team members were available to go over questions and navigate the new designs.

As part of the pop-up engagement, the team handed out:

- 500 fact sheets on the RPA Hospital Redevelopment brochures as a call to action to encourage feedback via the concept design survey
- 500 fact sheets on the Design Excellence Competition that allowed the team to procure good design and brought the highest quality thinking and originality to the project
- 500 fact sheets on the concept design phase that allowed the hospital plan to be brought to life
- 500 copies of the RPA Hospital Redevelopment September Newsletter, detailing information about concept designs, Project User Groups, the timeline of the project and other project information.

2. Online Community Session

Two online community sessions were held on September 13 and 14 2022, providing an additional opportunity for community unable to attend the in person pop up sessions to hear about the newly released concept designs for the RPA Hospital redevelopment.

The session was led by a panel consisting of senior project leaders, architects and leadership from the SLHD and RPA Hospital.

The online sessions were highly engaging and received the most feedback out of any of the engagement activities for the concept design release. Discussions focused on the redevelopment of the East Campus and the winner of the design competition, with details provided on improving entryways, wayfinding, upgrading the emergency department and adding new clinical spaces. The engagement closed with a highly productive question and answer session that is summarised below – refer below to the Online Community Session Summary, page 11.

3. Staff Forum

The RPA Redevelopment All Staff Forum, facilitated by SLHD Executive and HI representatives, was held on Tuesday 27 September 2022. The forum was well attended with 194 online participants.

The session summarised what had been achieved during the concept design phase of the redevelopment and briefed attendants of the next steps for the project regarding early works. The information session was closed out by an open question and answer session. Topics of discussions are summarised below – refer to pages 9, 10 and 11 of this report.

4. Survey

Members of the project team stationed at the Concept Design community pop-up handed out flyers informing staff and the public of the unveiling of the concept design and promoting the survey as a channel to provide feedback on the design. The survey was also promoted through emails, social posts, website, and posters.

The purpose of the targeted community presence was to:

- Inform the local community, consumers, and staff at RPA Hospital about the survey to encourage feedback on the design.
- Be present within the community and build relationships.
- Respond to any questions or concerns raised.

- Engage and provide project information to community and staff.
- Allow the community and staff to further understand the project.
- Answer any questions that could not be answered and respond on the spot.

Communication and promotion

The consultation program encouraged engagement and feedback opportunities through:

- A media release from the NSW Premier on 1 September 2022.
- Media release published as content on HI website, from 1 September 2022.
- Posts on SLHD Hospital's Facebook page on 13 September 2022.
- Posts on HI's LinkedIn page on 5 September 2022.
- A letterbox drop to the local community from 8 September 2022 (7202 homes)
- 500 fact sheets on the RPA Hospital Redevelopment, 500 fact sheets on the Design Excellence Competition, 500 fact sheets on Concept design, 500 printed newsletters distributed at community pop-up sessions on 12 September, 13 September, 14 September
- An Electronic Distribution Mailout (EDM) to staff on 12 September 2022.
- An EDM to all project subscribers from the community
- Online webinar sessions held for community, consumers and staff on 13, 14 September 2022

Pop-ups, Online Community Sessions and Staff Forum

The pop-ups, online community sessions and staff forum were hosted by members from SLHD and HI integrated project team. The purpose of the each was to:

- Provide opportunity for staff, public and consumers to access information, plans, documents with direct guidance from the project team in person or online
- · Gather feedback and insight into attitudes and initial reception of plans
- Use valuable feedback to inform future project announcements, engagement activities and redevelopment plans.

The three days of in-person pop-ups, two online community sessions and staff forum successfully delivered information on the newly released concept designs, the process of concept design, the Design Excellence Competition, and information about the RPA Hospital Redevelopment project broadly.

Whilst hosting the in-person pop-up sessions approximately 150 individual engagements were conducted over the course of the three-day engagement. The key themes that arose from the pop-ups were

- Environmental impacts
- Retainment of heritage
- Understanding of the new footprint of the Hospital
- Next steps in the project, details of next phase of works
- Movements of services/departments
- Disruption to hospital operations during construction
- Project timeline and approval status
- Parking

The online community sessions were well attended and saw great engagement with the content presented. The key themes expressed in feedback from consumers and the community focused on:

- Understanding the rationale, execution of the redevelopment
- What services and expansions would be delivered specifically.
- Capacity to deliver the project on time and on budget
- Project teams experience within the health sector, and also specifically of the design competition

- Ongoing impact on services
- Consultation, and community and stakeholder engagement
- Understanding the challenges and complexity of the project
- How the Connecting with Country principles were being incorporated into the design

The all-staff forum saw a very engaged and in-depth discussion of several topics in relation to the information presented on concept design. Attendants' participation in the closing Q&A session raised topics for discussion about:

- The block and stack of the new facility in relation to existing services
- The functional relationship between cardiovascular services, theatres, and ICU
- Parking
- Site access

The presentation and open Q&A activity was well received and subsequent feedback from attendees directly to the project team affirmed the success and positive reception of the session. Overall, the engagement sessions provided substantial positive feedback that reflected consensus on the staff's, consumer's and community's comfort and approval of the designs.

Survey

The survey was developed collaboratively between SLHD and HI. The survey's purpose was to:

- Utilise a communication channel that was easy to access and straightforward
- Gather feedback in order to inform further design considerations
- Provide a snapshot of the attitudes and behaviours around understanding needs including thoughts, opinions, and comments – from the survey population.
- Use valuable feedback as a baseline in future project stages to measure and establish further benchmarking.

The project team set up the surveys in the 'SurveyMonkey' tool to best capture the data and allow for a comprehensive analysis of data. A thorough interrogation was conducted on the results to ensure the project team had a high level of assurance with the outcome.

The reception of the concept designs by staff, consumers and community was overwhelmingly positive due to the comprehensive and informative execution of the consultation campaign. The survey was open for the month of September 2022. Advertised across multiple digital channels and promoted in 6500 physical flyers handed out publicly, only 3 responses were received.

KEY THEMES FROM CONSULTATION

The consultation sessions were well attended by consumers, staff and community. A range of different topics were discussed, and the feedback was positive in relation to the Concept Design that was on display. The online webinars were detailed and allowed the community, consumers, and staff to ask questions directly to the Integrated Project Team, including the Design Team.

The in person and online engagement sessions provided a comprehensive package of information regarding concept design that was received positively and drew minimal critical feedback during the sessions. This positivity and consensus around concept design is also reflected in the minimal engagement with the feedback survey. Feedback received via the community email during the concept design consultation period has also been considered in synthesising key themes identified in the program.

ONLINE COMMUNITY SESSION SUMMARY

Overview of the session

The communications team welcomed the attendees to the session, including an Acknowledgement of Country by the General Manager of RPA and introduced the panel who would be presenting and answering questions. The session was facilitated, and the panel consisted of:

- CE Sydney Local Health District
- General Manager RPA Hospital
- Redevelopment Manager and Sydney Local Health Districts Project Lead
- Project Director, Health Infrastructure
- Design Team

The team provided an overview of the purpose of the project and that the focus of the redevelopment would be within the East Campus. Detail was provided on the winner of the design competition (Bates Smart, Neeson Murcutt Neille) and the project scope including improving entryways, wayfinding, upgrading emergency department and adding new clinical spaces.

The newly released concept design was discussed with conversation focused on wayfinding, connecting with country, heritage, northern entry, and the east tower development and expansion.

The enabling works were discussed including their timing, the contractor, and that they will be done between October 2022 and mid-2023.

A timeline was provided that identified the schematic design phase, and the Significant Development Application as the next steps for the project.

The main works are anticipated to commence by end 2023.

The final part of the presentation outlined the community engagement, identifying this as an ongoing process during every project phase through to completion.

The team then held a facilitated question and answer session with participants.

Consultation feedback

The attendees had the opportunity to ask questions of the panel which consisted of the HI Project team, the SLHD representatives, and the architect team. The questions were generally around:

- The rationale for the project, and requesting further detail about exactly what will be delivered in terms of services and expansion
- The execution of the project, including the capacity for delivering on time and on budget
- The experience of the teams including of the design competition, and the specific experience with the health industry
- The ongoing impact on services through the project and what can be expected
- · Consultation, and community and stakeholder engagement
- · Challenges and complexity with the site itself
- Incorporating the Connecting with Country principles into the design.

During concept design consultation, the project team received a range of feedback. The key feedback themes received during consultation are outlined below and these will be incorporated into the schematic design phase and beyond.

HERE'S WHAT YOU TOLD US	RESPONSE
CONCEPT DESIGN	
Is it likely that concept design will change over time and evolve?	There is a process for schematic design where design will be refined and continue to evolve particularly as we continue ongoing stakeholder consultation. The concept design is indicative of where the project is at right now. The final design will be submitted for approval as part of the State Significant Development Application.
CARERS	
What is the current thinking about experience for carers who will spend time bedside on wards?	Through early concept design and planning, we are looking at opportunities to have spaces for carers, particularly in some of our single rooms. We are considering feedback we have received from stakeholders around this.
SERVICES	
What services will be part of this redevelopment?	The services that will be expanded include the emergency department, front of house, ICU services, and neonatal. There will also be enhanced imaging and radiology services, as well as more adult inpatient beds and more operating theatres. Overall, there will be more capacity across the hospital, improved wayfinding, entranceways and welcoming spaces as people enter the hospital.
ENGAGEMENT	
Will service level agreements (SLAs) and MOU's be reviewed as part of the redevelopment project?	We will be consulting with all key stakeholders and consider how the project interacts with more formal agreements established through providing services at the hospital. This will also occur in conjunction with the Sydney Biomedical Accelerator project.

PURPOSE

Why is this redevelopment needed?

RPA has a significant role in the NSW health system. We have considered the growth of our services and where the community demands are increasing and changing. A clinical services plan was initially established considering the future of health services in this area. That has underpinned the redevelopment project.

DELIVERY AND BUDGET

How confident are we in the design being delivered on time and on budget?

NSW Health has an excellent track record of delivering hospital projects, the project will be monitored and controlled closely. There will be a team of experts monitoring the costs and timing to ensure we are tracking well as the project moves along.

COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

What consultation has taken place other than community engagement?

Consultation with staff has been taking place including through project user groups with specific departments and services including medical, nursing, administrative, and support staff. Some consumers have been involved in these groups as well.

What have you been hearing at the community pop ups?

We have had lots of people attend the pop ups, with a mix of staff and consumers. The feedback is that people are interested in seeing the redevelopment plans and are seeking out information about the project overall.

Can you outline the importance of the long-standing partnership between the hospital and the community?

It is incredibly important to hear from consumers and community about how the services can work best for them. Continuing to engage with our community and stakeholders will ensure we gather feedback, and consider it in planning for the redevelopment, and ensuring it is fit for purpose and meets the needs of the community.

STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION

Will Transport for NSW be consulted, and will this help improve roads access into the hospital?

We have worked closely with Transport for NSW and meet with them regularly to discuss improvements and requirements. We have also been working with the City of Sydney around traffic and transport as well. A large focus for us is the emergency department and the access in and out. We are also working on a green travel plan to encourage more sustainable forms of travel where possible and feasible.

DESIGN COMPETITON

Could you please share the experience of the design competition?

We were focused on working closely with the Government Architect on this, bringing new ideas and a fresh way of looking at the vision for the hospital redevelopment. The design competition did generate a number of new ideas, and potential improvements for the redevelopment. The competition allows architects to focus energy into providing the best possible outcome for the hospital, and the process continues until schematic design where it is then further developed with a broader development team.

PROJECT CHALLENGES

Could you talk through the challenges you face with the hospital site?

The area is highly developed and surrounded by big precinct partners, including the colleges and Sydney University. There are a number of constraints across the site that the team has been working to solve to ensure we can meet the needs of the different services on site. The construction itself will be challenged through congestion on site, however, we will be appointing a very experienced and reputable builder for the project to develop appropriate construction methodologies to limit the impact on the hospital, its stakeholders and the community as much as possible.

CONNECTING WITH COUNTRY

Were there any difficulties in applying principles around designing with country when working with the Government Architect?

The Government Architect has a robust process in place and lots of experience around this. There was an extensive consultation process with internal hospital stakeholders and external stakeholders around this. This fed into the design and the architects will continue to take on board feedback we get through the process. There is a strong history and connection with the Aboriginal community in Sydney. This project provides a chance to build on that and incorporate it into the design.

ARTS AND CULTURE

Is there an arts and culture strategy included in the redevelopment?

There is an Arts Advisory Working Group in place who will engage with the project and assist to incorporate arts into design and planning for the redevelopment.

SERVICE DISRUPTION

What do we anticipate in terms of disruption to clinical services during construction?

During construction there will be some disruptive works that may occur. The project team will work closely with the builder on methodologies to minimise anything that may impact services, such as power outages, noise, and dust. Once we have methodologies in place, we will liaise with the hospital to work around these impacts. This is a robust governance process to ensure all parties are satisfied with the proposal before work commences.

IMPACT ON HOSPITAL CAPACITY

What will the capacity increase be from the redevelopment?

We will be improving and increasing the size of our emergency department, which is likely to double in size, including a doubling of treatment spaces. We are significantly expanding our intensive care services and relocating to a new purposely designed contemporary space. We also have additional operating theatres, more adult inpatient beds, more neonatal cots, more workplaces for education and training, and increased interventional medical imaging.

What is the architect's experience in working with the health industry?

We are working as part of an extensive team to find the best possible public health outcome for a complex project. We are working to bring together complexities, stakeholders and our expertise to find and deliver a solution. We are also working to connect with country to find the right connections. This is very satisfying, and we are looking forward to delivering the best public project that we can.

MILESTONES

Is there a birthday party for the hospital reaching 140 years?

We are having an eight-day celebration to mark the 140th anniversary of the hospital which is actually on September 25th.

SURVEY OUTCOMES

There were 3 responses to the survey for the RPA Hospital Redevelopment project. The survey was distributed and / or promoted using:



All development applications for significant projects in NSW have to go through a comprehensive assessment process undertaken by the Department of Planning and Environment. This process is called a State Significant Development Application (SSDA).

There are many steps in the SSDA planning process, including opportunities for you to have your say on the hospital plans.

The first step in the process is a request for the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs), which identifies what must go in the environmental impact statement.

What is the Royal Prince Alfred (RPA) Hospital Redevelopment?

The NSW Government has committed \$750 million to the redevelopment of RPA Hospital. This significant and exciting investment focuses on improving the experience for patients, carers, visitors, staff and the community now and into the future.

Why is the RPA Redevelopment needed?

Since its foundation in 1882, RPA has been a respected provider of healthcare, maintaining the philosophy that our doors are always open to those who need our help. As one of the oldest hospitals in Australia, RPA provides critical lifesaving functions and is recognised as a worldwide leader in healthcare excellence and innovation.

The RPA Redevelopment will deliver new and upgraded facilities that will enhance existing services, support the creation of new services and expand the future capacity of PPA

The redevelopment is a once in a generation opportunity to deliver future-focussed, critical health care facilities that will improve the experience for patients, staff and the community now and into the future.

What services will the redevelopment deliver:

In 2019, the RPA Clinical Services Plan (CSP) was developed by Sydney Local Health District following extensive consultation with RPA departments and services, staff, clinicians and stakeholders.

Where is the project up to?

The RPA Redevelopment is currently in the planning phase with significant progress made since the project was announced for fast-tracking in late 2020, as part of the state's COVID-19 Recovery Plan.

A State Significant Development Application (SSDA) will be prepared for the RPA Redevelopment and lodged with the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) in 2022.

What is the Camperdown Health, Education and Research Precinct?

Statutory planning

A State Significant Development Application (SSDA) will be prepared for the RPA Redevelopment and lodged with the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment in 2022.

Main works cannot commence until approval has been granted by the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment through the SSDA planning process.

What is an Environmental Impact Statement?

An important component of the State Significant Development (SSD) process is the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

An EIS accompanies the State Significant Development Application (SSDA) and sets out how potential impacts on staff, residents, visitors, the community and environment will be managed. These impacts include transport and access, amenity and public domain, air quality, noise, dust and vibration and other important environmental considerations.

The EIS goes on public exhibition as part of the statutory planning process, providing the opportunity for stakeholders and the community to find out more about the project, ask questions and give feedback.

Construction

When will main works construction start?

The RPA Redevelopment will include early and enabling works in advance of main works, to help achieve early additional clinical capacity for the RPA Hospital and prepare the site for main works to commence.

Early works have commenced with the relocation of the Kidney Centre at RPA to a new fit for purpose location in the Professor Marie Bashir Centre.

Other early and enabling works will be carried out during 2022 that include the relocation and realignment of inground services, as well as the refurbishment, expansion and construction of new facilities.






Graph 1: Responses to question four




Graph 3: Responses to question seven
